Ride Safely Insurance Coverage

Because I have been "in business" with horses for a lot of years, I am very aware of the liability I feel we have as horse owners and having people around our horses. I feel that I have been very lucky in that my barn has been around a long time, and I have had very few horse related accidents by people other than family members. The first truly bad accident was by a boarder working on her own horse. The horse was in crossties and she was picking out his feet. Someone walked by a window and spooked her horse whereupon she was flattened by the horse when he slipped and partially fell on her. She broke a leg, but recovered and was able to ride again. The second was a friend to whom I was showing my horses in the pasture. We never really knew why it happened but she was kicked and ended-up on the ground unconscious. She went to the hospital and ended up in a neck collar for

a number of months. In neither case was I contacted by my insurance company or any other, but I feel that I was very fortunate.

I have talked with my insurance agent and she said that usually a person is covered if they are not "in business," which means that as long as they're not receiving remuneration for any horse services, they would be covered. However, if I am accepting payment for boarding someone's horse I wouldn't be covered because I was "in business" even though it had nothing to do with the person who fell off MY horse. To reiterate, if I were taking payment for any horse related service I would not be covered by my homeowners' insurance.

My safety suggestion: Talk with your insurance agent and be sure of how much and what kind of insurance you have.

From New England Equine Medical & Surgical Atrial Fibrillation

Abstract

Atrial fibrillation is one of the most common cardiac arrhythmias in horses. A cardiac arrhythmia is an abnormal heart rhythm while normal heart rhythm is called sinus rhythm. Breeds predominantly affected include Standardbreds, draft horses, and Thoroughbreds. Atrial fibrillation is primarily seen in adult performance horses because its effects are usually only seen at higher heart rates associated with exercise. This is because at rest or low speeds, atrial fibrillation does not affect the heart's ability to do its job. The heart can still pump blood well enough to supply the body with adequate oxygen. When the heart rate increases, atrial fibrillation interferes with how well the heart can fill with blood so it pumps less blood into the body. In more formal terms, atrial fibrillation interferes with atrial filling, leading to decreased cardiac output. This is why the most common clinical sign of atrial fibrillation is poor performance.

Heart Anatomy and Physiology 101

The mammalian heart has four chambers. The top two are called the right and left atria. The bottom two chambers are called the right and left ventricles. Oxygen-poor blood flows from the body into the right atrium via the vena cava. The blood then passes through the tricuspid valve into the right ventricle where it then travels via the pulmonary arteries to the lungs. In the lungs, gas exchange occurs so that red blood cells release carbon dioxide and pick up oxygen. The now oxygen-rich blood is transported via the pulmonary veins to the left atrium. It travels through the mitral valve into the left ventricle where it is then pumped into the aorta and into the systemic circulation.

Powering this blood flow is a network of nerves that fire in a coordinated fashion to contract different parts of the heart at different times. The first signal occurs at the sinoatrial node, which sends an electrical signal across the atria to move blood from the atria to the ventricles. This first electrical signal also contacts the atrioventricular node (AV) node, which then fires a second signal through the network of nerves in the ventricles to tell the ventricles to contract. This ventricular contraction closes the valves between the atria and ventricles, the "lub" when you listen to a heartbeat, opens the aortic and pulmonary valves and pushes blood into the body via the aorta or lungs via the pulmonary artery. Afterward, the aortic and pulmonary valves close, producing the "dub" sound, and the heart chambers refill. Then the cycle repeats!

Clinical Signs

Like mentioned above, the most common clinical sign of atrial fibrillation is poor performance. Classically a horse will get to the end of a race and suddenly slow down and/or stop. Other signs include coughing, shortness of breath, and nasal discharge. Sometimes, horses have no outward signs and the arrhythmia is an incidental finding on a routine exam.

Diagnosis

Diagnosis is made by a veterinarian detecting an irregularly irregular rhythm while listening to the heart. Electrocardiogram (ECG), which evaluates and measures electrical activity in the heart, confirms atrial fibrillation. Usually heart rate will be normal. Heart rates can be abnormally high as well, which indicates poorer prognosis.

Treatment Options

Treatment of atrial fibrillation involves returning the heart to normal sinus rhythm. This can be accomplished two ways: pharmacological cardioversion and electrical cardioversion. Both of these procedures take place in a hospital. Before either procedure occurs, an echocardiogram, or an ultrasound of the heart, is performed. This is because atrial fibrillation can cause structural changes to the heart, which is an important prognostic indicator for a horse's response to treatment. These structural changes can be reversed if atrial fibrillation is treated promptly. If present, however, these changes make the horse more predisposed to recurrent atrial fibrillation.

In pharmacological conversion, a medication is given that changes the cell signaling in the atria to return to normal firing pattern. Quinidine is the most commonly used medication but others have been used in refractory cases. Quinidine is usually administered every two to four hours to effect via nasogastric tube due to its irritating effects on the oral mucosa. While treatment is taking place, the horse is monitored closely for conversion via ECG and for adverse side effects.

Electrical cardioversion involves the placement of a special catheter in the right atrial cavity and another in the left pulmonary artery. Local anesthesia (intravenous sedation and nerve blocks) is used to feed the catheters through the jugular vein to their respective locations. Correct placement of these catheters is confirmed by echocardiogram and chest x-rays. The horse is then placed under general anesthesia and the atria is electrically shocked back to correct

rhythm. Due to the special equipment and personal training required, only certain universities perform this procedure. Electrical conversion is generally reserved for cases that are refractory to or recur despite pharmacological conversion.

Prognosis

Whether a horse responds to conversion depends on several factors including resting heart rate, duration of atrial fibrillation, presence of cardiac structural changes, and concurrent cardiac disease. In horses that have a resting heart rate of 60 beats per minute or less, have had atrial fibrillation for four months or less, and have a murmur less than grade 3/6 - or no murmur at all - have the best prognosis. They have a 95% success rate with pharmacological conversion. Recurrence occurs in 25% of cases.

Primetime Riders - Are you Listening? By Sam Morrison CR level IV Clinician, Greene, ME

Think about it, we use all our Centered Riding basics - soft eyes, centering, breathing, and building blocks - which combine to allow grounding, and then we add clear intent. But, how about soft ears? Are you aware of all that goes on around you? Do you really listen? The horse does.

The horse has very acute hearing; much more so that we humans. So how about becoming aware of the sounds in the arena, your horse's hoofbeats, his breathing, the neighbor's dogs barking, turkeys gobbling in the woods, the birds singing, the vehicles going by on the road, or the wind blowing. Horses are very aware of details in what they see and hear. Try feeling and thinking like your horse for a deeper understanding of what and how the horse is seeing, hearing, and possibly reacting to. Sometimes by having this awareness, a deep breath will keep your horse calm and focused on the ride. It can help alleviate any sudden nervous response from the horse.

The horse indicates with his ears, acting like radar, where his attention is and what he is thinking. Tight, tense ears are an indication of mental and/or physical tension. Ears pointed stiffly straight ahead might mean he also has hard eyes as he is listening intently to figure out what he is seeing. It can be an indication of curiousness or of his preparation to panic and flee. Ears pointed softly forward means he is attentive, concentrating on his course or an obstacle. He can have each ear move independently in different directions. He can have one ear back listening to the rider and the other ear listening out the window or listening for sounds along the trail. Ears can be rigid if he is tense, or softly flopping if he is mentally relaxed and physically comfortable.

As a rider, pay attention to all this sound input for better awareness, then let it fade into the background using your clear intent and have a peaceful connection with your horse for a comfortable, harmonious ride.

As an instructor, while watching the rider in view, try becoming aware of the sounds coming from the rider and horse behind you. You can listen to the hoofbeats, for example heavy pounding sounds when the horse is on his forehand and almost no sound when the horse is carrying himself in good balance. You can hear the rhythm of the gaits and the tempo of the beats. The intensity and regularity of each footfall will vary if the basic rhythm is lacking or the horse is unsound. Ears were given to us for a reason, so try to combine soft ears with soft eyes and the other basics while discovering a true unity with your partner, your horse



Maine Horse Association (MHA) News, Notes, and Nickers By Dollie Hutchins, MHA Administrator

It's here! The MHA show circuit opened its season with the American Saddlebred Association of Maine sponsored Long Horn Horse Show at the Hollis Equestrian Park, in Hollis on April 28. Even though we've had a wet, cold spring, the grounds were in tiptop condition with no mud, no puddles, and no dust, along with a beautifully groomed show ring and warm-up arena. Under the managerial leadership of Peggy Drummey, along with Show Secretary Regan Grant, Steward, Sylvia Corbett, and Announcer Dollie Hutchins, the show ran smoothly. Jo Hight held forth in center ring as the judge with Caroline "Rusty" Morrison as her ringmaster. Tari Hodgkins handled ribbons and trophies. Blue ribbon winners received glassware with a snacky treat tucked inside. Doing yeoman duty as gate keeper, especially since she had very recently had shoulder surgery, was Sonja Mooers. This capable crew greeted many first-time exhibitors, new combinations, riders moving up from academy divisions, and a number of riders moving up to the canter/lope divisions.

The largest and toughest division of the show was 11 and Over Pleasure. Relatively new to the MHA recognized shows, this division is for horse(pony)/rider combinations who are not competing in any type of competition requiring a canter or lope during the current season. It not only provides show experience for these riders, but serves a variety of needs including older juniors and adults who are just learning to ride; riders who need confidence before entering canter/lope classes; horses who need show experience or who haven't mastered the canter; those who want to show but no longer canter: and those who have trot/alternate gait horses. Since it is the combination that is restricted, riders may canter another horse and the horse may canter with another rider. This flexibility serves many exhibitors. However, this class's counterpart, 11 & Over Equitation, is only for riders who do not canter or lope in competition on any horse at any level.

The winner of the 11 and Over Pleasure class was Jenn Paratory and her horse Quecca. The excellent red belonged to Pam Lear with her family's Hidden Hollow Hot Shot. Showing just how competitive this division was, the championship belonged to Sophia Rowe and her family's AKA Wild Twist, with Emma Tomasula and her Stormy Quest earning the reserve championship. That's four different riders in the top spots in the pleasure division! In the 11 & Over Equitation division, Hannah LeRoy with her horse, I Walk The Line, topped Judge Hight's card with Isabella Rowe aboard AKA Wild Twist, second. The championship was the reverse with Isabella making the victory pass.

Among the new combinations this season, Charlestown Firestorm (owned by Nikki Tibbetts) and Dixie Szabo, who's moved into the canter divisions this season, made a stellar debut winning the Youth Activity Pleasure qualifier and championship as well as the Hunter Pleasure Equitation class. Another rider moving into the canter/ lope divisions, Michelle Guillemette with her Quarter Horse, Investor's Diamond, proved he was a diamond as they won both the MHA Pleasure Western qualifier and championship.

The Costume Class was a huge crowd pleaser! It featured a knight (Kelsey King) and his dragon (mini horse, Jingles) and a flower bed (Hidden Hollow Hot Shot) with his bumble bee (Emma Grace Lear). The knight/dragon won the class with the bumble bee perched on her flower earning their share of cheers for the red ribbon I would be amiss in not mentioning the first victory pass of the season with Ashlyn Bosse's winning the Open Grooming class with her Quarter Horse After Elegance. Judge Hight gave the grooming entries a very thorough inspection! With her signature no stirrups victory pass, Courtney Grant and her partner Jean Poole made the final pass from the ring as winners of the MHA Pleasure Horse English Championship.

By the time this article is read in early June, ASAM's Specially Designed Show (5/12); the new Maine Event Spring Premiere (5/17-19) and the FEA Black Diamond Jubilee (6/2) will have been held. 
